## Compliance

- 2025 OMB Compliance Supplement in draft stage Single Audits delayed until officially released by OMB
- President Trump signs EO 14332: "Improving Oversight of Federal Grantmaking"
  - Authorizes OMB to revise Uniform Guidance
  - Allows revision of discretionary grant terms and conditions to permit immediate termination for convenience
- Volume of Executive Orders makes compliance challenging
- Subrecipient monitoring Nonalignment with Executive Orders creates increased liability for the City

- New application strategies:
  - Propose only projects with minimal schedule risk and secured local funding
  - Utilize Grants Manager to strengthen alignment of applications with Notice of Funding Opportunities and preferred vocabulary
