


Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Overview

❖What is the CIP?

- Planning Document
- ❖ 5-Year Fiscally Constrained Capital Improvements
- Airport, Roads, Stormwater, Water, Sewer, Facilities, Parks, IT Networks, Capital Programs
- ❖ Local practice: Projects greater than \$75,000 (match Administrative Approval threshold)

State Statutory Definition: (RSMo 447.700)


"Public capital improvements", capital improvements or facilities <u>owned by a governmental agency</u> and which such agency has authority to acquire, pay the costs of, maintain, relocate or operate, or to contract with other persons to have the same done, <u>including but not limited to</u>, highways, roads, streets, electrical, gas, water and sewer facilities, railroad and other transportation facilities, and air and water pollution control and solid waste disposal facilities.

 - TDiscuss short list of unfunded projects in waiting to build depth on the bench
 - ❖ Link projects and programs with Strategic / Comprehensive Plan
- Annual Project Authorization Process
 - 5-year Plan Adopted in Comprehensive Plan by Planning Commission
 - City Council Adopts 5-year Plan by Resolution
 - Funding for 1st Year of CIP is in authorized as part of the City Budget
 - ★Indicates Public and/or Elected Official Input Required

 - Parks Greenway Master Plan
 - Pavement Infrastructure Conditions Inspections
 - Stormwater Service Requests
- UNFUNDED for several years
 - Higher priority projects funded in 2017 CIP Sales Tax
 - No funding for trail
 - Did not meet Stormwater CIP program criteria
 - No funded program for local road re-construction
- Funding Allocated in FY24 CIP
 - Local Road re-construction program created in 2021
 - Stormwater structural flooding verification in 2021
 - Additional Public Engagement PWC and Council Prioritization

 - Highly Aligned with City's planning documents

Project Title: Douglas Street Improvements - Blue Parkway to 4th Street

Type: Bridges, Streets & Signals Activity #(pending)

Project Description

This project will improve Douglas Street from Blue Parkway to 4th Street. The project includes, but is not limited to, paving, sidewalks, curb, storm drainage work, street lighting.

Project Purpose

This project will re-construct the existing infrastructure that has deteriorated over the long life of the roadway. The City has received many service requests in this area related to roadside ditching, stormwater, sidewalks, routes to school. The project supports the City's Livable Streets Policy.




