# Executive Summary

## AP-05 Executive Summary

### 1. Introduction

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines the City of Lee’s Summit as an entitlement community. With this designation, the City receives an annual allocation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program funding. The previous year’s funding was \$385,005.00. The 2026-2027 funding allocation is \$394,640.00. To administer this funding, the City is required to submit an Annual Action Plan identifying community needs and funding priorities. This Plan provides the framework for implementing and carrying out the strategic priorities and long-term objectives identified in the 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan.

The information contained in this Action Plan covers the second year of the 2025-2029 Consolidated Plan period and will begin on July 1, 2026. Through this Plan, the following goals were identified as high priority:

- Improve housing opportunities by creating and preserving decent, safe, affordable rental and homeownership housing.
- Reduce and prevent homelessness in the city by providing needed housing and wrap-around services.
- Create a suitable living environment through infrastructure and public facility improvements.
- Provide public services to expand economic opportunities, improve health and safety, enhance food access, and provide other assistance for low- and moderate-income households, seniors, people with disabilities, and other eligible groups.
- Support administration of the Community Development Block Grant program.

The above goals identified were established through a collaborative process established in the City's Citizen Participation Plan. This includes the solicitation of CDBG funding requests from local public service agencies and housing agencies, evaluation and prioritization of funding needs, a public hearing, a 30-day public review and comment period, and the approval of the governing body.

The 2026 Action Plan continues to maintain strong local partnership between City government and non-profit services and housing agencies. With these partnerships, the goals and objectives established in the Consolidated Plan will be implemented. The recommended funding

allocations focus on supporting on-going programs that have been proven to address the critical needs of the community as identified in the Consolidated Plan. CDBG funds also help agencies to leverage other resources in support of their programs.

Funded programs on the non-public service side have continued to focus on maintaining the current affordable housing stock in Lee's Summit. Truman Habitat for Humanity has continued the Home Preservation Program, this program addresses both minor and critical repairs to qualifying residents. In the last year, they have benefited 16 homes with repairs including new roofs, driveways, replacing dangerous HVAC and electrical repairs as well as minor painting and radon mitigation

Even with limited funding, all priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan will be addressed this year. Local agencies are still encouraged to explore alternative resources to support and expand their programs.

## **2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan**

The 2026-27 Action Plan seeks to make impacts in four main areas:

- continue supporting public service agencies and programs that have received CDBG funding in prior years in order to help them maintain a similar level of service;
- continue to support the agencies and programs benefiting low income families;
- continue to support services for children exposed to domestic violence and adults with mental health and substance abuse issues; and,
- continue to provide financial assistance to LMI homeowners for the upkeep of their homes through the Home Preservation Program.

The outcomes will benefit a total of about 2700 individuals and households and improve approximately 12-15 affordable housing units.

## **3. Evaluation of past performance**

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

The City continues to fund most of the programs it has historically and adjusts funding priorities to match the annual needs as identified by the community and the annual application cycle. The programs included in this Action Plan have been funded and in operation for several

years. The agencies offering these programs and services utilizing the CDBG funds have proven to be solid in terms of their performance as well as their impact on the community's well-being.

The City's CDBG program maintains partnerships with local nonprofits providing essential services for low-income households as well as with other City departments to assess progress, provide extensions where necessary, and reallocate unused funds where necessary. In addition, the City has a monitoring and evaluation system in place to determine subrecipient performance levels. This is considered during the evaluation and prioritization of funding allocation.

Overall, the City continues to make progress on achieving our stated goals and objectives from the Action Plan and the Consolidated Plan.

#### **4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process**

The public outreach and consultation process for this Action Plan consists of a public awareness campaign via press release, solicitation of requests for funding, pre-application informational meeting, public hearing and a 30-day public review and comment period.

A press release was posted on the City's website on December 19, 2025. The press release specifically stated:

- Applications for the 2026-27 CDBG program year would be available on January 6, 2026;
- Applications would be accepted from January 6 through February 6, 2026; and
- A public hearing would be scheduled where applicants could present their projects before the Community & Economic Development Committee.

On February 21, 2026, a public notice was published in The Pulse and at City Hall announcing the Community and Economic Development Committee (CEDC) public hearing scheduled for March 11, 2026, utilizing estimated funding amounts. This hearing provides citizens with an opportunity to hear funding proposals from local agencies, as well as staff funding recommendations, public comments, and the prioritization of the proposals. Once heard, committee discussions occur and recommendations are established for consideration by the full City Council.

A 30-day public review and comment period was held March 12, 2026, through April 11, 2026. The plan is available on the City's website, as well as hard copies of the plan available upon request.

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**Lee's Summit Community Development Block Grant Application Period Begins January 6**

The City of Lee's Summit will accept applications from qualified agencies for 2026–27 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding from Jan. 6 – Feb. 6, 2026. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development awards federal grant funds to the City annually. These funds must be used to meet the needs of low- to moderate-income individuals and families, address slum or blight in Lee's Summit, or meet an urgent need.

Lee's Summit is designated as an Entitlement Community under the CDBG program, giving the City authority to administer the grant funds locally. The City received \$385,005 for the 2025–26 grant year. Funding for the 2026–27 program year, which runs July 1, 2026 – June 30, 2027, has not yet been announced.

Public agencies and nonprofit organizations may apply for the grant to support eligible programs and projects. For-profit entities may also be eligible if the proposed activity serves a public purpose and meets the national objectives and the City's CDBG Consolidated Plan objectives. Individuals are not eligible to apply.

A voluntary pre-application orientation will be offered on Jan. 5, 2026, at 2 p.m., for public agencies and nonprofit organizations interested in applying. The session will cover key regulations, policies, timelines, compliance and monitoring.

The City Council's Community and Economic Development Committee will hold a public hearing in March 2026 for applicants to present their proposals and for the public to provide input before the committee develops a funding recommendation for City Council approval.

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## AP-10 Consultation

### Introduction

The City of Lee's Summit Development Services Department coordinates the consultation process for the Community Development Block Grant Program 2025-29 Consolidated Plan and the subsequent Annual Action Plans. The consultation process for this Annual Action Plan included a community awareness campaign through the City's press release, an open request for proposals, an informational pre-application meeting, a public hearing that is attended by community stakeholders along with oversight by the Community Economic Development Committee and concludes with a public review and comment period.

The City maintains a communicative relationship with the Lee's Summit Housing Authority to ensure the availability of public housing stock in Lee's Summit. The City also has a Wellness Commission that advises and recommends the City Council of plans, programs, and projects which improve the health and well-being of City residents. This is in alignment with the 2020 Ignite Strategic Plan's Community Health and well-being goals and objectives. The Commission supports, promotes, and develops community resources in mental health, fitness, walkability, bike-ability, multi-modal transportation, and community well-being.

The City actively works with both local and regional agencies to meet community needs, identify service gaps and utilize resources as needed.

### **Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.**

Lee's Summit is a part of the service area of the Greater Kansas City Coalition to End Homelessness (GKCCEH), the designated regional Continuum of Care (CoC) serving the Jackson County, Missouri area and has been working with the network over the years as needed. In evaluating the role of Lee's Summit in addressing homelessness, GKCCEH and their embrace of the Housing First approach were considered as a means of assessment. Effective attainment of this approach can be measured by the implementation of policy and provision of funding that ultimately leads to the creation of permanent and sustainable housing for all homeless individuals.

Within Lee's Summit, there are many services in the community that are supported by the City in their efforts to actively prevent and reduce homelessness.

The following programs will contribute to the prevention of homelessness:

- Hope House: An emergency shelter in Lee's Summit that serves victims of domestic violence, including children
- Hillcrest Transitional Housing: Works to house homeless individuals, families, and youths in an environment that encourages working and the development of life skills
- Lee's Summit Social Services: Provides emergency assistance to low-to moderate-income individuals and families
- Truman Habitat for Humanity: Provides home repairs and resources for housing needs

## AP-12 Participation

### **Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting**

The City advertised funding availability via a press release on the City website. The press release was posted on December 19, 2025. The press release stated:

- Applications for the 2026-27 CDBG program year would be available on January 6, 2026;
- Applications would be accepted from January 6 through February 6, 2026; and
- A public hearing is scheduled for applicants to present their programs to the City Council Community and Economic Development Committee in early March.

The public hearing consists of City staff reviewing, prioritizing, and making recommendations based on funding levels and identified priority needs. During the hearing, each agency is able to present its program to both staff and the Community Economic Development Committee to communicate its funding needs. Questions and comments are heard from the Committee as well as any citizens who may be present. Once the hearing is concluded, a public comment period is open for 30 days to allow additional feedback to be received. This was advertised in The Pulse on February 21, 2026. Hard copies of the Action Plan are available for public access upon request and are also accessible via the City's website.

The City also hosted a Pre-Application meeting open to community stakeholders, which was attended by local nonprofit agencies and low-to-moderate income housing providers. The purpose of this meeting was to establish guidelines and eligibility requirements, while also allowing stakeholders to openly discuss needs within the community.

For planning purposes, the City utilized the previous year's allocation of \$385,005 until it received its actual annual allocation of \$394,640 on April 3. Contingency language was included in the draft AAP for the public hearing prior to the annual allocation being announced, and once the City received its allocation, updates were made to the language and budget accordingly.

#### Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

Each year, the City of Lee's Summit strives to fund projects that serve areas with the greatest need as determined by factors such as percentage of low- and moderate-income population, substandard housing stock, and need for other improvements. Additionally, the City funds projects that address priority needs of income-eligible households and special needs populations living throughout the city. The funded 2026 projects are aligned with at least one priority need/goal as identified in the Consolidated Plan.

The greatest obstacle to addressing underserved needs is the lack of financial resources available to address those needs. As Federal resources have been reduced over the years by amount and inflationary factors, the City must work strategically to target Federal dollars to the greatest needs, think creatively to craft projects that create the greatest impacts, and find ways to leverage other funding sources.

### Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

The City has not designated any target areas for the use of CDBG funds but will locate any projects that qualify based on Area Benefit criteria (i.e., benefit all residents of an area where at least 51 percent of the residents are low- or moderate-income) in eligible LMI tracts or block groups.

Several of the City’s PY 2026 activities will be available to low- and moderate-income households citywide, including Habitat for Humanity Home Preservation and Public Services.

### Discussion

Input received during development of the 2025-2029 Five-Year Consolidated Plan emphasized the need to reduce affordable housing burdens and maintain the housing stock for low- and moderate-income families. Because families with needs, including needs related to homeowner housing repair/rehab, may reside anywhere within Lee’s Summit, the City makes these programs available citywide. Public service activities designed to assist low- and moderate-income families, people who are homeless, and non-homeless special needs groups are generally located in areas most accessible to the clientele being served.

During the 2026 program year, the City estimates that 80% of grant funds will be dedicated to projects assisting low- and moderate-income residents, surpassing HUD’s requirement that a minimum of 70% of CDBG funds is used to benefit persons of low or moderate income.

# Affordable Housing

## AP-55 Affordable Housing

### Introduction

Access to decent affordable housing will continue to be a priority for the City of Lee’s Summit during the 2026 program year. The City maintains a strong commitment to preserving and maintaining the existing supply of affordable housing through owner-occupied rehabilitation and repair programs and funding for the development of affordable single-family housing for homeownership.

### Discussion

## **AP-60 Public Housing**

### **Introduction**

Residents in the City of Lee's Summit are supported by the Lee's Summit Housing Authority. According to HUD's 2023 A Picture of Subsidized Housing (APSH) data, the housing authority has a total of 116 Public Housing units, 290 Project-Based Section 8 units, and 326 Housing Choice Voucher units for a total of 733 publicly supported housing units in the city. According to the LSHA website as of February 11, 2026, the Public Housing waiting list has been closed since July 31, 2024.

### **Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing**

The LSHA 5-Year Capital Improvements Plan included this Duncan Estates Exterior Rehabilitation in its project, consisting of a total of five phases to six residential buildings to be completed by 2026.

### **Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership**

All LSHA board meetings are open to the public and accessible in-person or via Zoom. The LSHA also works with residents to develop their 5-Year Strategic Plan and Annual Plan. Resident meetings, monthly potlucks, and monthly newsletters are also held or distributed to increase resident involvement in the development of relevant housing authority activities and policies.

### **If the PHA is designated as troubled, describe the manner in which financial assistance will be provided or other assistance**

The housing authority is not receiving CDBG funds this program year.

## AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities

### Introduction

For PY26, the City of Lee's Summit plans to provide funding to organizations that provide outreach to low-income households and residents experiencing homelessness. Coldwater is a faith-based nonprofit centered in Lee's Summit that operates a food pantry and a clothes closet, offers emergency food during the week, and provides weekend backpacks for hungry schoolchildren. During the summer months, they offer a non-competitive T-ball program (League of Smiles) and summer lunches and bar-b-que dinners to local neighborhoods. During PY26, the City of Lee's Summit plans to dedicate \$9,082.00 to support Coldwater's BackSnack program, which provides free snack lunches in backpacks for weekend meals to school children who are chronically hungry. The City will also provide \$22,828.00 to cover operating expenses for Lee's Summit Social Services, which provides outreach to low-income households and residents experiencing homelessness through its food pantry, bread room, and thrift store.

### **Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including**

In response to evolving community needs, the Lee's Summit Police Department continues to collaborate with behavioral health providers and local service organizations to strengthen a coordinated approach to homelessness. The partnership is focused on aligning law enforcement, outreach, and social services to provide a more consistent and service-oriented response. Dedicated outreach capacity is being established to enhance engagement efforts and improve coordination in the field, along with expanded training to support effective collaboration. As the initiative progresses, partners will evaluate data, identify service gaps, explore additional community partnerships, and pursue diversified funding opportunities to ensure long-term sustainability and shared investment.

### **Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs**

Homeless shelter services are provided by the CoC of the Greater Kansas City region. In addition, Hillcrest Transitional Housing operates shelter units in Lee's Summit. Our focus is on providing financial assistance to local public service agencies that target residents who are temporarily homeless due to domestic violence or who are potentially becoming homeless due to mental health issues. Activities receiving CDBG assistance this program year that help reduce chances of people becoming homelessness include services provided by Hope House and Coldwater. In addition, CDBG funding is provided to Hillcrest Transitional Housing to provide case management counseling services to its Lee's Summit client families. The City will

coordinate and work with CoC for its outreach and assessment efforts.

### **Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons**

During PY26, the City of Lee's Summit plans to dedicate \$13,643.00 to providing a case manager for Hillcrest Transitional Housing. Case management supports residents of transitional housing in connecting to needs such as employment, services, and housing.

**Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again**

During PY26, the City of Lee's Summit plans to dedicate \$22,828.00 in CDBG funding to fund operating expenses for Lee's Summit Social Services. The agency serves low-to-moderate income individuals by providing basic necessities and assistance that can help prevent homelessness. These services may include rent and utility payment assistance, transportation, clothes, and food.

**Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.**

Prevention initiatives play a key role in both long- and short-term strategies to address homeless prevention and counseling for the families they serve. In the 2026 program year, the City will direct CDBG funds to several of these programs to alleviate budget shortage. In the meantime, CDBG support will also benefit local agencies and programs that provide services targeting LMI persons and persons with special needs for housing, health, and other social services.

### **Discussion**

The City's CDBG funding distribution process is a competitive one where the City opens funding request opportunities to all local agencies that provide services to meet the priority goals of the Consolidated Plan. Agencies file funding requests based on financial support needs and funding

allocations decisions are based on priorities, agency capacities and funding availability.

## AP-75 Barriers to Affordable Housing

### Introduction:

Housing market data and stakeholder input both indicate a tight housing market in Lee's Summit, with increasing rents and limited opportunities for first-time homebuyers. While the market depends largely on the private sector to provide housing, there are roles the City and others can play through policy and regulation that may encourage greater private investment in new housing development in Lee's Summit.

Lee's Summit's 2025 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice identified several factors that were contributing to barriers to fair housing, including:

- Lack of affordable housing for low- and moderate-income households
- Lack of housing and services to address homelessness
- Limited supply of accessible housing for people with disabilities
- Limited incomes and lack of access to resources restrict housing choice among protected classes
- Lack of resources and coordination for fair housing outreach, education, and enforcement activities limits residents' access to fair housing services

Participants in the Consolidated Plan process identified similar negative effects of policies and practices on residential investment, such as limited funding for the development of affordable housing. In addition to these public-sector barriers, the private market creates barriers as well. For example, some landlords may refuse to rent units to households receiving Housing Choice Vouchers, families with children, or tenants with therapy/service pets. These practices reduce the affordability of existing units in the private housing stock and create barriers to obtaining affordable housing.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The City of Lee's Summit will address barriers to affordable housing by implementing the actions detailed in its 2025-2029 Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice related to the impediment of a limited supply of affordable housing for low- and moderate-income households, including:

- Consider addressing limitations in missing middle and multifamily housing types by making changes to the Comprehensive Plan and land use map to open more

neighborhoods to townhomes, duplexes, and small apartment buildings by-right; further reduce minimum lot sizes; create more medium and high density multifamily and mixed-use acreage; adopt minimum density requirements (especially around transit nodes and commercial and public services); and use underutilized industrial and/or commercial areas for adaptive residential use.

- Investigate the potential for adopting a mandatory or voluntary inclusionary zoning ordinance, including what has worked for other Missouri jurisdictions (e.g., Kansas City) within the framework of state law. Approval could include agreement on a specified percentage or number of units of affordable housing or commitments to make payments to an Affordable Housing Trust Fund in exchange for development concessions and incentives that lower the developer's costs of production.
- Develop an Affordable Housing Trust Fund to support development of affordable housing, including making loans and providing other kinds of financing to help affordable housing projects become reality (e.g., providing gap financing for Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) multifamily rental communities).
- Consider ways to provide funding to promote housing affordability, such as implementing an Affordable Housing Bond to fund affordable housing development and other programs, including homeownership, repair and rehabilitation, rental assistance, land acquisition, and/or seed money for a community land trust (e.g., Kansas City affordable housing bond to support its Housing Trust Fund; Lawrence, KS affordable housing trust fund funded by local sales tax and federal funds).
- Consider making affordable housing a priority when disposing of public land. Consider deploying City-owned land in partnership with affordable housing developers and community-based organizations to support affordable housing development.
- Consider partnering with large property owners to provide information and resources related to affordable housing development.
- Consider meeting with affordable housing developers to understand barriers to housing development and develop strategies to address those barriers.
- Consider meeting with other Missouri cities that have implemented Community Land Trusts to understand the role the City might take in supporting the development of a CLT, including facilitating the process of forming a CLT and providing financing through funding and land resources to help get it started.
- Work with affordable housing and owners of large properties to facilitate affordable housing development, including diverse housing types and housing accessible to residents with disabilities.
- Develop a Housing Resource Center or webpage to be a one-stop-shop for housing-related resources such as housing counseling/ referrals, rental assistance, resource

navigation, homeless services, eviction diversion, legal assistance, landlord-tenant mediation, and healthy homes programs.

- Consider funding City- and community-based housing initiatives, including homebuyer assistance, homeownership education, fair housing training, and other programs.

## AP-85 Other Actions

### **Introduction:**

This section details the City of Lee's Summit's actions planned to ensure safe and affordable housing for its residents, along with plans to meet underserved needs, reduce poverty, develop institutional structure, and enhance coordination between public and private sector housing and community development agencies.

### **Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs**

The major obstacle to meeting underserved needs is limited funding. The City will continue to encourage public service agencies to actively explore and pursue new funding opportunities. The City will also continue to explore and participate in regional solutions to some of the underserved needs.

### **Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing**

The City of Lee's Summit will fund multiple programs to foster housing affordability, including continuing to use CDBG funds to support development and rehab of affordable housing by Habitat for Humanity. In addition to specific programs designed to foster and maintain affordable housing, the City will review its zoning ordinances for prospective barriers to affordable housing development and make amendments as needed.

### **Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards**

The City of Lee's Summit integrates Lead Safe Housing Rule requirements into housing policies and procedures by following HUD's Lead Safe Housing Rule requirements in all of the City's federally funded affordable housing development activities. Over the next year, the City of Lee's Summit will continue to conduct lead-based paint inspections and, if a hazard is found, remediation. These actions will both reduce exposure risk and help to maintain the city's older, lower and moderately priced housing. Any housing rehabilitation activities conducted using CDBG funds will continue to monitor closely for any potential lead exposure.

### **Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families**

Over the 2026 program year, the City of Lee's Summit will continue to collaborate with the Continuum of Care to coordinate with homeless, housing, and service providers. Homeless service providers will continue to offer job search and resume assistance and connections to workforce development opportunities, as well as emergency shelter, transitional housing, and services such as food, clothing, and childcare. The City will continue to use CDBG funding to provide public services to reduce poverty, including meals for children, case management services in transitional housing, and operating expenses for Lee's Summit Social Services. A focus on the development of affordable housing with access to public transit will also help low-income families access more employment opportunities, while lowering

transportation and housing costs.

### **Actions planned to develop institutional structure**

The City of Lee's Summit has developed a robust administrative structure to manage its CDBG funds. The City's Development Services Department offers seminars for potential subrecipients to learn more about the CDBG program. In addition to working with organizations, the City's citizen participation process is designed to make engaged and informed citizens another vital part of the institutional structure. City plans focused on affordable housing, homelessness, and public services provide overarching goals and frameworks for collaboration among agencies and the use of federal, state, local, and other funding.

### **Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies**

- Continue to provide training for agencies receiving CDBG funding
- Continue to encourage agencies, private or public, to communicate and coordinate
- Continue to monitor CDBG subrecipients on performance and provide technical support as needed
