HISTORY OF THE SIGN

The Dayton Hotel existed in downtown Lee's Summit for decades. It's iconic neon sign could be seen along Third Street. Our research shows the sign was probably made here in Lee's Summit. For certain, it was maintained over the years by Summit Neon Signs. After the hotel closed, the sign was removed in the early 1990s. For more than 25 years the sign gathered dust. The building's new owner recovered the sign and began restoration. We have replaced and upgraded the neon tubing/insulators and the internal electrical systems. In addition, we have strengthened the steel sign framework. It is ready to shine again.







