- Loops service from Douglas Road to Blue Parkway
- Serves the Unity Village property annexed into the City.
- Provides water service to support development of property previously outside of the city along the I-470 corridor.





TAP FEE ORDINANCE




- The Original Tap Fee Ordinance became effective March 1, 1996
- Purpose
 - To Establish a funding source that provides adequate water capacity to meet the additional demands created by new growth
- Requires an annual report to the City Council.
 - Statements
 - Recommendations

ORDINANCE REQUIREMENTS



- Statement of Application for Service
 - Number and Size of Water Taps
- Statement of Water Tap Fees Collected and Disbursed
- Summary Statement of Water Facility Projects
 - Initiated, completed and planned
 - Consistent with Water Tap Fee funding
- Recommendation for Revisions to the Project List and Tap Fee Calculation, as appropriate.
