Intro to CDBG

Lee's Summit is an Entitlement community. As an Entitlement community, Lee's Summit receives an annual allocation of funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) through the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG).

Three National Objectives:

- 1. Benefit low-to-moderate income (LMI) persons
- 2. Address slums or blight; or,
- 3. Address a particularly urgent community need (disaster response)







HUD Required Plans

- Consolidated Plan (5 Year Strategic Plan) identifies community needs, prioritizes those needs, details strategies (goals and objectives) to address identified needs. (adopted in Dec. 2019)
- Citizen Participation Plan Plan that sets forth policies and procedures to encourage public participation in plan preparation and amendments. Revisions are on an as needed basis. (adopted in Dec. 2019; amended and adopted June 2020)
- **Annual Action Plan** more detailed plan with specific projects, activities, and budget for each of the 5 program years (July June). This is our 2nd year action plan.





Action Plan Requirements

- Must identify annual goals and objectives and they must be directly linked to CON Plan goals and objectives.
- Must identify programs/projects to be carried out
- Must specify how these programs/projects will be funded
- Must indicate performance measures and anticipated accomplishments

- Staff Evaluation & Prioritization (February)
- Staff Funding Recommendation (February 26)
- Council CEDC Public Hearing & Recommendation (March 10)

- City Council Adoption (May)
- HUD Approval (submit in mid-May)







Recent Grant Levels

The funding allocation for PY 2021-22 has been announced at **\$350,684** this is a *decrease* of approximately \$22,000 from last year.

Evaluation and Prioritization

- Funding requests were first evaluated to determine:
 - Completeness of application;
 - Eligibilities (Agency, Program and Beneficiaries);
 - Meeting priority needs identified in Consolidated Plan;
 - Agency capacity to carry out CDBG funded activity in full compliance of the federal regulations and City standards.





Evaluation and Prioritization

- Requests were prioritized taking into account:
 - Funding availability and constraints (caps)
 - Admin (20%)
 - Public service (15%)
 - At least 70% must be used to benefit low-to-moderate persons
 - Existing services City's CDBG program has been supporting or new service
 - Urgency and consequences if not funded
 - Agency's past history of performance and compliance risks

- Staff will present funding recommendations
- CEDC will discuss funding options
- CEDC will approve a recommendation for Council approval

Lee's Summit's Chronically Hungry Children

75-80 chronically hungry preschoolers in Lee's Summit identified for this school year by counselors & social workers at Great Beginnings Early Education Center & HeadStart schools

Coldwater funds them ALL

HOW Harvesters' BackSnacks & Weekend Food Packs MAKE A DIFFERENCE

An evaluation of the program has shown the following:

- Grades improved by as much as 18%.
- BackSnack students had 14% fewer absences and 23% fewer tardies.
- 34% of parents say their children's health improved and 33% say their self-esteem improved.
- Schools report discipline issues for BackSnack students were cut in half.
- Teachers see significant improvement in social skills, responsibility, participation and behavior.


- Focuses on issues relevant to children who have been exposed to violence, such as self-esteem, safety planning, conflict resolution skills, and healthy ways of managing one's emotion.
- •Includes individual, group, and family therapy for children ages pre-school through 18 years of age.
- Available for children in residential and nonresidential services.
- Hope House anticipates renewed grant funding will provide approximately 30 children with 200 units of therapeutic services.




NUMBER SERVED & DEMOGRAPHICS (CY 2020)

Total Hours of Service: 3,058.75








CDBG FUNDING NUMBER SERVED & DEMOGRAPHICS (CY 2020)

ReDiscover Case Management of High-Risk Students

- At-risk Lee's Summit Elementary school children (K-6) (illness, injury, academic issues, emotional disturbances etc.)
- Referred by parents, faculty, administrators, school resources officers
- Helps children and adolescents develop the personal skills needed to cope with challenges while building and maintaining healthy relationships at school and at home
- ReDiscover qualified mental health professionals provide assessment, crisis prevention/intervention and counseling for student at also are levels in coordination with local school districts
- Funding from MO DMH, Medicaid.

LSHA Overview

- The Public Housing Authority (PHA) of the city of Lee's Summit, MO and greater Jackson County
- Recipients pay 30% of total household income for rent & utilities
- Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher
 - Baseline of 649 vouchers
 - Serves families
- Public Housing Program
 - Serves Seniors (age 62+) and Disabled
 - Lee Haven Apartments 50 units, opened 1967
 - Duncan Estates 66 units, opened 1996

Present CDBG – Duncan Estates Exterior Phase I

- Built in 1996, Duncan Estates has never had a complete rehabilitation. Building exterior systems showing signs of end of useful life.
- FY-2021: City made grant of \$140,000 to complete Phase I (16 units)
 - Leveraged \$90k of HUD Capital Improvement funds
 - Total Development Costs = \$230,000
 - Scope of Work Replacement of all exterior systems for eight (8) duplex buildings. This includes cement fiberboard siding, windows, doors, gutters and downspouts, eves and soffits, front porch posts, etc.
 - To Be Completed in Summer of 2021

Need: Phase II of Duncan Estates Exterior Rehabilitation

- The exterior vinyl siding, windows, doors, gutters, downspouts, soffits, and front porches are 25-years-old & near end of useful life.
- Total Project Scope for Phase II: Total replacement of all exterior systems for twelve (12) buildings containing twenty-four (24) units
- Total Project Cost: \$300,000 for Phase II
- Request for Phase II (summer 2022) = \$200,000
- Would leverage approximately \$100,000 in HUD Capital Improvement Funds for FY-2022

What is Home Preservation?

A variety of construction related services provided by Truman Habitat as general contractor for existing low or moderate income homeowners in Lee's Summit.

- Home Improvement
- Critical Home Repair
- Weatherization

Home Preservation

Greatest Unmet Need is for Critical Repairs

- 2020-21 Critical needs include:
 - Full roof replacements including guttering
 - Hazardous electrical remediation
 - Plumbing/sewer failure
 - Furnace replacement
 - Foundation repair and water diversion
 - Hazardous tree removal



Comparison of Projects



LS Minor Home Repair Program 2019 – \$99k for projects

Minor exterior home repair services completed with 2019 program year monies:

- Gutters (5)
- Exterior Painting (6)
- Windows (3)
- Roof Repairs (2)
- Porch Repairs (2)
- Exterior Door (1)
- *2 Homeowners dropped out of program, and 2 have yet to complete any repairs
- *8 households will benefit
- *Homeowner responsible for obtaining bids/contractors

Truman Habitat for Humanity Home Preservation Program 2020 - \$100k for projects

Minor exterior home repair services (anticipated to be completed this year based on approved applications):

- Exterior Painting (4)
- Tree Removal, Landscaping, Brush and Debris Clean-Up (3)
- Minor Roof Repair (1)
- Roof Replacement (1)
- Plumbing/Sewer Repair (2)
- Minor Exterior Building Shell Repair

Weatherization (2)

Critical Home Repairs - work performed to address safety issues or code violations (3)

- *Estimated 15 households will benefit
- *Habitat works directly with contractors, secures bids and guarantees work completed

Habitat provides a Hand-up. Not a Hand-out.

Affordable & Flexible Repayment Options

Different activities have different price structures, based on regulations and appropriateness standards. Pricing policies must be applied **consistently**. Habitat works to reduce project cost through donated material and labor when feasible.

Examples:

- Critical Home Repairs repaid through sweat equity equivalent to 10% of project cost
- Home Improvement and weatherization
 – sweat equity and 7 year, 0% interest, unsecured loan
